London, Sukkat Shalom Reform Synagogue, 1 Victory Road, Hermon Hill, E11
(Merchant Seaman's Orphan Asylum at Wanstead Hospital,
Chapel by George Somers Clarke 1861-63. Contains fixtures and fittings
from the synagogue at the former Tottenham Jewish Home & Hospital 1913-18)

Note: All buildings are purpose-built and in use as synagogue/Jewish communal facility unless otherwise indicated. Converted Victorian churches, chapels or industrial schools used as synagogues are excluded from this list - two 18th-century chapels in London are, however, included. Private residences built or occupied by Jews are omitted, except in the case of Mediaeval structures, which are listed separately.
